MINUTES FOR THE PMBA ANNUAL MEETING OCT. 18, 2022

Center Grove Church

Rev. Steve Corts, Senior Pastor of Center Grove Church, welcomed everyone to Center Grove Church and led the Scripture reading and Invocation, reminding those gathered that the greatest ministry of mercy is evangelism.

Rev. Philip Crouse, Moderator, Senior Pastor of Germanton Baptist Church, issued a call to order. He invited everyone to look over last year's minutes and called for a vote. There was a correction. Nick Poindexter serving as vice-moderator this past year and Todd Parker as treasurer. The minutes were approved with these corrections.

Congregational music and worship followed led by Roman Hendricks, Worship Leader.

Rev. Nick Poindextor, Vice-Moderator, recognized special guests:

Ralph Garay and Russ Reaves with NC Baptists,

Dr. Wade Arnold who led our counseling and coaching groups,

Guests in the lobby - Matt and Allison Willis with their book - MasterLife Together and Tom Kakadelis with the NC Policy Council.

Rev. Walker Armstrong, PMBA's Executive Director, recognized a few exemplary churches and pastors, Pastor Steve Corts of Center Grove Baptist Church and Pastor Nathan Cline of Revo Church

More congregational music and worship followed.

Rev. Armstrong asked those gathered to show Steve Corts and his staff our appreciation in applause.

Rev. Armstrong recognized his staff Beth Warfford and Maria Weisz, and he recognized the board members for their support, guidance, and friendship.

Rev. Armstrong introduced the 2023 theme of the year: "Go Beyond Survival." He recounted the history of the mission of the Pilot Mountain Baptist Association and the changes that have been made since 2016. He discussed the impact of the pandemic on local churches, identifying two major issues: pastors becoming more isolated and churches becoming more insulated. He noted the trend of churches trying to survive rather than thrive, and expressed the need for a renewed vision to combat this trend.

Rev. Armstrong shared the Pilot Mountain Baptist Association's new vision statement: Our vision is to help churches go beyond survival by igniting a movement of revitalization by doing two main things. First, encouraging pastors/ministry leaders to lead from a place of health. Second, equipping churches to re-discover their missional genius by taking the Gospel to broken people locally, regionally, and globally.

Rev. Armstrong then went on to share how this vision would be worked out. through impact groups, coaching and consultation, and collaboration between pastors and ministry leaders.

Rev. Armstrong also expressed a continued desire to support pastors through free services and events designed to heal hurts, maximize talents, and boost marriages such as free counseling and coaching and marriage retreats.

Rev. Armstrong shared the history of the PMBA's name and shared a desired name change as the association looked to better represent who we are and where we are going next. He expressed that Pilot Mountain Baptist Association would still be the association's legal name, but they would use a new operating name, Triad Church Network.

Rev. Armstrong expressed that the name represented moving forward, penetrating lostness, and connecting together for greater Kingdom good, and he assured those gathered that the association was not disowning Baptist Doctrine, but rather, more accurately reflecting who we are and where we are.

Rev. Armstrong shared that we would call for a vote later.

Rev. Armstrong expressed his privilege to be a part of this association for the last seven years, but shared that due to increasing chronic health problems he would be retiring from the association in 2023.

Those gathered recognized Rev. Armstrong with standing applause.

Rev. Armstrong introduced Bob Bickford, Associate Director of Replant.

Rev. Armstrong led those gathered in praying for Mr. Armstrong and his message and the future of the association.

Mr. Bickford presented the Annual Meeting message. He thanked associational pastors and leaders for their support of the work taking place across North America, shared his story of revitalizing a church, and taught from Acts 16:6-10 and encouraged those gathered to fully, joyfully, and faithfully engage with the mission of God.

Rev. Armstrong shared that City Park Church and Citizens Church had gone through watch care and were ready to become full members to the association.

Rev. Philip Crouse, Moderator, Senior Pastor of Germanton Baptist Church, called for a vote and the motion was approved.

Rev. Armstrong welcomed Kings Village Church and expressed their desire to enter into the watch care system.

Rev. Crouse called for a vote and the motion was approved.

Rev. Armstrong called for the removal of First Baptist Church on 5th from membership, for going against the bylaws of the PMBA.

Rev. Crouse called for a vote, one opposed, but the motion passed.

Rev. Crouse reintroduced the proposed name change to Triad Church Network as well as the proposed bylaw changes.

There was a motion to table the vote on the name change. That motion received a second. Eighteen in favor. Thirty-six opposed. Tabling was denied.

Rev. Crouse reshared the initial motion to change the name to Triad Church Network. Thirty-six approved. Nineteen opposed. The motion passed.

Rev. Crouse called for a vote for the changes to the bylaws. All proposed bylaw changes were affirmed.

Rev. Todd Parker, Treasurer, Executive Pastor of Edgewood Baptist Church, reported on the Associational Budget, noting that for the first time in several years, giving was not more than the budget. Expenses were \$677.33 more than income and \$74,683.19 less than budget. Designated funds expenses were \$103,283.09 less than budgeted.

Rev. Crouse announced the Installation of new officers for the coming year:

A vote of affirmation then followed this announcement, and the leadership team, focus teams, and Associational staff are prayed over.

Rev. Jeremy Parker introduced and prayer over the Jim Hamblin Local Missions offerings.

Kari Wilson, Clerk, Communications Director of Two Cities Church, then closed the meeting with a Benediction.

TCN EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

On June 1, 2023, I had very little idea of all that was involved in being the Executive Director for the Triad Church Network. Don't get me wrong: I knew a little bit. I didn't go into this position blind.

However, stewardship of this ministry over the last few months has taught me quite a few lessons already, and I expect to learn many, many more. Some I will undoubtedly learn the hard way. Others I hope to gracefully learn with the help of so many great pastors and folks who just want to see the TCN region experience the grace of God in as many ways as possible until He returns.

My first goal these past few months has been to meet with and encourage as many of our pastors as possible. I've gotten around to quite a few, but there are still some I need to connect with before the end of the year. I believe healthy relationships with our pastors and church leaders will yield great things for the future of TCN.

Relational connection and health are paramount to a strong Christian life, and that is especially true for those serving in ministry. And yet, this group tends to have the fewest friends and close relationships. One of our goals at TCN is to help those serving in church ministry develop deep, abiding relationships with others who will encourage them, truly fellowship with them, and walk through the ups and downs of ministry together.

Because of this focus, Impact Groups were created, then emphasized, and then fully funded as of last year. Currently, we have 6 Impact Groups going strong in our Network (5 for pastors, 1 for youth leaders).

As of September, we started the 7th Impact Group for Administrative Professionals. These folks are typically the front lines of ministry in our churches as they answer phones during the week, are typically the face of the congregation to those who call and visit the church offices on weekdays, and sometimes bear the burden of ministry part-time or even as volunteers.

Maria Weisz in the TCN offices is reaching out to your AP already. Please encourage whoever handles these tasks in your office(s) to respond and engage with Maria as she seeks to build a group that will meet their needs and encourage this group. Their first meeting will be January 24, 2024 from 10 AM to noon. To encourage this group to attend, yes, there will be gifts given out.

Beyond that, we are going to seek another Impact Group Leader in 2024 who desires working specifically with bi-vocational pastors. This is a growing ministry in our Network (as well as state-wide and nationally), and we want to tailor an Impact Group to your needs and schedule.

2024 will also see an emphasis on Pastors and their wives. We're going to focus this effort in two ways:

- 1. Our annual Marriage Retreat: I really wish I could give you all the details about this retreat, but they just are not final yet. We're close to having our dates, location, and agenda lined up. The speaker is ready! This is going to be a great retreat, trust me.
- 2. Pastors Wives Impact Group: We are planning for, and recruiting a leader for, this group, and it has the potential to have tremendous impact across TCN. Our hope is to connect those who support our pastors most closely with other spouses so they can pray for one another, encourage each other, and support one another in the ministry.

Lastly, let me take a moment to offer sincere gratitude. Thank you to Walker Armstrong and the foundation he has laid. He has been a friend, a mentor, and an encourager through these last few years, and I'm grateful for his support.

Thank you to Kim Rhue and the Personnel Team for the interview and hiring process. They exemplified due diligence, and I look forward to continuing work with this team. Kim has been a blessing to TCN this past year!

I'm grateful for Beth Warfford and Maria Weisz for the last 4+ months of working together. These ladies know our churches, love the Lord, and tolerate working with me. Pray for them!

I'm so thankful to Glenn View Baptist Church for so many things. Thank you for letting me mature in ministry the last 17 years. Thank you for hosting our annual meeting this year, and thank you for all that I could never verbalize. GVBC Rocks!

Pastors and church leaders, thank you for being welcoming and patient as I have made the transition these last few months. It's a joy getting to know you, your staff, and your church. I look forward to more connections, more coffee, and more ministry together.

Last, and most assuredly not least, thank you to my wife and both kids. I love y'all, and I would not want to do life with anybody else.

God Bless y'all, God bless your church, and let's dive into 2024 knowing that the Savior has called us to "Press On" toward the goal to which we've been called. The world needs us. All 5 of our counties need all 90+ of our churches, plus the ones we're planting. This is the mission of every church, and we want to help you accomplish the mission and be found faithful.

LEADERSHIP TEAM

Your Triad Church Network (TCN) Leadership Team has been meeting quarterly for the last year to set direction and cast vision for TCN. We have met with Brad for the last three meetings of 2023, and part of those conversations included the following:

- Marriage Retreat review and planning for 2024: we reviewed surveys following the 2023 marriage retreat and look forward to offering a great marriage renewal experience in 2024. Look for more details coming soon!
- Regular reports from our Impact Group Leaders: with 7 Impact Groups now offered (5 for pastors in our 5 Zones, 1 for youth leaders, and a new group for Administrative Professionals), our leadership team is consistently working to encourage and enhance these groups to equip our churches to make disciples by building up the staff members.
- Waughtown Baptist Church property sale: this property sale is scheduled to close October 16, 2023. Your Leadership Team has been discussing the options for how to utilize those funds for future ministry. We have decided to pay WBC's rent to the new owners for the first 6 months of their ownership. Beyond that, we will work with WBC, Rise Church, and the new owners to ensure a Gospel presence remains on that corner for as long as possible.
- TCN Membership Requirements: a TCN member church requested the Leadership Team address our current standards for membership and whether a basic confessional statement could be added to the TCN By-Laws to ensure some level of doctrinal clarity and agreement. Your Leadership Team has determined the following:

1. Our Articles of Incorporation read as follows:

"To counsel together for the enlargement, expansion, and the strengthening of the work of our Lord, to promote unity, growth, and fellowship among the member churches, and further the spirit of cooperation with and in Baptist work in general as set forth by the Baptist State Convention and by the Southern Baptist Convention."

2. Our By-Laws state the following under Article II, B. What We Believe, 1. Faith Foundations: "As a family of local congregations, we are brought together by the ties that bind us in the faith given by the grace of God. We proclaim that we have...

'...one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all...' (Ephesians 4:5-6)

- a. We confess the Lordship of Jesus Christ and the authority of Scripture in the lives of our churches and in the ministry of the Association.
- b. We seek to encourage the growth of the missionary spirit and development of an evangelistic climate in the Kingdom work of our congregations to fulfill the commands of the Great Commission. (Matthew 28:19-20)
- c. We are committed to investing in the lives of others so that the Kingdom might be advanced and our Lord and Savior might be glorified.
- d. We affirm the historic Baptist principles of autonomy of the local church and the freedom of affiliation.
- 3. Under Article IV. Membership, A. Composition, our By-Laws state: "The Network shall be comprised of Baptist churches who are in their faith, polity and practice in harmony with the spirit and work of the Network and are actively participating in the support and work of the Network.
- 4. These statements do not provide a foundational confession upon which a common definition of "faith foundations" and common agreement on basic Baptist doctrines can be established.
- 5. The TCN Leadership Team would like to propose the following path:
 - a. Present amended By-Laws language at this meeting (2023). This does not represent the final language of the By-Laws but a proposal to be considered.
 - b. Offer TCN member churches 1 year to review the changes with an opportunity to ask questions at a date in the Spring of 2024 to be determined by the incoming Leadership Team (voted on at the 2023 annual meeting).
 - c. Present By-Law revisions to member churches by September 1, 2024.
 - d. Vote on the By-Laws at the 2024 annual meeting to read the following (or similar language): "Triad Church Network affirms the Baptist Faith and Message 2000. Although we recognize that every local church is autonomous, and is therefore able to

adopt its own statement of faith, this association seeks to accomplish its stated mission in accordance with the Baptist Faith and Message 2000."

Your TCN Leadership Team has considered these actions for several years now, and we understand many of the implications of this action. We ask that you prayerfully communicate with your congregations and seek to join with us in supporting this By-Law change. Questions can be directed to our Executive Director, Brad Wright, or our newly elected Moderator, Jeremy Parker, or our newly elected Vice-Moderator, AJ Reynolds.

CHURCH PLANTING

The Network has continued to provide direct financial support to two church planters. Joe and Duncan Maye serve in the inner city of Winston-Salem and Dustin and Jill Connor who serve in NW Calgary, Canada.

RISE CHURCH – WINSTON SALEM, NC

It has been an exciting year for Rise Church! We have seen God's faithfulness through sustaining existing ministries as well building on that foundation to launch new works. Some of the things for which we'd like to give God glory include:

'Rise Academy' launched in the Fall of 2018. We are praising God that the class of kindergarteners we launched with just entered the 2023/24 school year as 5th graders and we are now operating as a full K-5 elementary school with 42 students. We are praying and believing for God's continued grace as we actively plan to begin middle school next year!

We have also been able to expand the way we serve our students, families, and communities through the launch of a new program, Rise Afterschool Program ('RAP'). This program runs Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays from 3:30-5:30 throughout the school year, and weekly throughout the summer. RAP exists to provide holistic care for the next generation of community leaders through a safe environment, rooted in Christ's love, saturated In joy, and

inspiring them to RISE to all that God has created them to be. Each day, students receive a snack, a devotional time, homework help, reading buddies, special clubs, STEAM activities, field trips, and time to just be a kid!

Our adult internship program, the 'Crimson Crown Institute' is celebrating launching our 2nd class of interns. This year long program is designed to serve new believers from our community through holistic discipleship, ministry training, and kingdom living. We are blessed to have 4 interns, 3 of which are Rise Academy parents, who are growing and serving daily through this opportunity.

In the past year we launched our 'Righteous Oaks Residency' program with our first 2 residents. This is a 2-year, hands-on ministry training experience to help train and empower people called to serve among marginalized communities. We study the variety of ways that Shalom is robbed from our communities and what it looks like to pursue justice and flourishing in these areas. Residents are empowered to discover the ways in which many communities are forsaken by the world, but not by God, and how they can leverage their lives and gifts to the pursuit of seeing these communities rebuilt, restored, and renewed (Isaiah 61).

Additionally, our mentoring program, 'Royalty Mentoring', hosted another training and paired an additional 4 mentors with mentees. We saw the launch of a new weekly men's ministry (PACK), an active women's ministry that took their first retreat to Greensboro, an elementary girls and youth ministry, and a weekly Kingdom Prayer night where we walk through our community and pray for God's Kingdom to come here as it is in Heaven.

We are in awe of God's goodness in the ways we have seen him work in the past year and are incredibly hopeful for the days to come. We are exceedingly grateful for the support of the TCN as well the countless prayers and volunteers from TCN churches who partner with Rise in impactful ways. We praise God for the Kingdom partnership of the TCN!

I give thanks to my God for every remembrance of you, always praying with joy for all of you in my every prayer, because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. Philippians 1:3-5

Paul's words always make me stop, think about you (our partners) and thank God for you. Here's why ...

Two years ago in the fall of 2021, we were still navigating the pandemic, wondering what was next for our church and our family and feeling quite anxious. That October, one of the leaders of our church plant came to my door unexpectedly and, handing me a bag of my favorite local coffee, told me I was taking 6 weeks off. The reason for this was that my heart (physically) had been beating hard and irregular for 4 months and getting worse. Didn't know why but I was stubborn and just thought I could push through it...until it started to scare me. So I took all of October 2021 off to visit several doctors and do several rounds of bloodwork ... all to discover stress was the factor. My wife and I (Jill), along with our small group of leaders, worked hard to keep our 18 month old church plant going for the first year and a half of the pandemic. But come Fall of 2021, my body let me know it was exhausted, stressed out and needing a break from the unexpected workload and emotional, mental and physical challenges of shepherding a baby church through such a difficult time. During that month off, I fell into a depressed state for the first time I could remember and started forming our escape plan. Our church had money in the bank to last 2 more months, our handful of leaders were also tired and I really didn't feel like I was in good place personally to shepherd the 40 or so people still part of our church. I really thought I was done as a planter/pastor in Calgary.

But then God stepped in ...

- God surprised us in 7 different ways from both partner churches, individuals and anonymous givers locally to help us get our footing financially.
- God brought together Hope Church and Northern Hills Church in April 2022 to discuss merging as one new church to move forward better together out of the pandemic.
- God brought us new people who wanted to be in a small church plant and help it get ministry momentum back.
- God has renewed our passion for the 95% of people in Calgary who don't know Jesus.

This is just the tip of the iceberg of what God has done for our family and Hope Hills Church! I've stopped being surprised when God does the unexpected to take care of His Bride!

I say all this to say thank you! We are only still doing ministry in Calgary because we had generous partners like you praying for us, supporting us financially and bringing mission teams (even when vaccines were required to cross the border). God blessed us with a great medical team at Novant Forsyth Hospital in Winston Salem, NC. Kathy and I deeply appreciate your concern, cards, prayers, meals, gifts and all the blessings we have experienced and continue to receive. God is good and we trust Him . . . thx David and Kathy

This is a report we were asked to share with ministry partners and churches this October 2023. You guys are partners with us in this ministry and we wanted you to Praise God with us and hear the glories of our God and King.

This is not an exhaustive list but is a compilation of many things God has allowed us to be a part of in 2023. I know you share with us the responsibility of proclaiming the Gospel in places and lives where it is not regularly shared.

As an **Evangelism Catalyst**, we are **missionaries with NAMB**, from local churches, to focus on sowing the gospel among an unreached or under-reached people group, strategic place or affinity group. We seek to organize those reached into small groups that can become a church or intentionally assimilate them into an existing local church.

Our **primary focus** is evangelism efforts **outside the local church**. We also equip and engage members of the **local church in reaching the lost**.

We focus on a particular people group, population or demographic segment and develop contextual approaches that will reach out with the gospel

to these people groups. We recruit/enlist local church members to engage in reaching these people/groups with the gospel.

We Actively facilitate the assimilation into the local church of those who respond to the gospel, or work to incorporate them into a new church plant.

We were blessed this year and have seen God work in our lives and in the Mission Center in 2023.

God Loves You BUS in Multi-Family Housing Communities and Special Events The God Loves You BUS, is a Mobile Classroom that we take into communities and to churches year around. This Converted Church Bus has custom perimeter seating, big screen TV, an A/V system and is a mission tool to help us reach families and children to "Share the Gospel of Jesus Christ". We have worked with churches, local community outreach, block parties and outdoor events. The Bus has a bright and inviting color scheme and is also a large billboard for the Gospel. In 2023 the bus was used in over 100 Gospel meetings and appx. 2,000 people heard the story, music and scripture of Jesus Christ.

Volunteers in Missions

Jesus said "The harvest is large, but the workers are few. So ask the Lord who gives this harvest to send workers to harvest His crops." Luke 10.2

We pray for workers and churches to be involved with us in ministries in locations across Winston Salem and Forsyth County and God is answering prayer. We are thankful for the interest and desire to help spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ in Multi-Family Housing Communities.

The North American Mission Board (NAMB) reminds us that ...

- 57 % of North America lives in Multi-Housing and
- 95 % are lost without Jesus Christ and also unchurched

We are thankful for the Church Partnerships and volunteers that have expanded the ministry of **Mission Center** to be involved in more locations and ministries.

Physical Needs that provide opportunities to share the Gospel

We sponsor and distribute Food, Winter Coats, School Supplies, Elementary School Books, Jesus Loves Me Book Buddies, Home Welcome Gift Bags, and Kids Gift Bags. All of these are Tools used to Share the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Men's Disciple making in Multi-Family Housing Communities

We meet weekly in public with men that are New Believers in a small group for Breakfast and Discipleship. Sharing God's word with these men is the heartbeat of **MISSION CENTER.**

Distribution of the "The GREATEST WARRIOR" Bibles

We have received and shared 5,000 of these Bibles in Churches, to men who will share with other military men and groups as requested. These Bibles (**New Testament, Psalms, Proverbs**) have been used as a great witness since they also have **highlighted stories** of our soldiers that have come to faith in Jesus Christ.

Opportunities to help Coach and Provide Resources with churches and Missions God has blessed us with an abundance of tools that we can share with missional churches to help them in their vision for their community. The Generosity of others to us is the fuel that keeps the mission going forward in Missions. We want to share with other partners in ministry and to express our gratitude for each church's partnership with us.

NAMB - WMU Christmas in August Program

This program has helped us work with churches, pastors, and associations in 5 states and we have been invited to help them get involved in their local Multi-Family Housing Communities. Many churches have given us gifts (school supplies and household items) that we will use in "Making Contacts and Building Relationships."

Boys 2 MEN

We are aware of the great need in our communities to reach **Middle & High School Boys** and Young Men with the Gospel and Discipleship. These Boys are Fatherless and need "ON RAMPS TO THE GOSPEL". Pray as we have strong Christian Movie nights, Sports Nights, and Adventure Nights each with a BIG Cookout, Meal, a Christian Speaker and Testimony Time, and that they would respond to the Gospel.

BREAD OF LIFE FOOD PANTRY: DEBBIE GAMBILL

This ministry provides food to those in need but also provides a place where people come not only to receive food but also a smile, and words of encouragement, and each are prayed with before they leave. We try to show the love of Jesus to each person, and we tell them that we love them, but most importantly we tell them that Jesus loves them way more! The volunteers feel that they not only feed with food but also feed spiritually. We know most all the pantry clients by name after a visit or two. We have seen an increase in new clients in the past few months. We have averaged about 27 families each month over the past year- serving over 320 families. But in September we saw an increase and served 35 families for the month. We appreciate those who have given donations of food and those who have given monetary donations. We could certainly use more donations, especially since prices have increased. We also appreciate a neighbor bringing fresh produce from her garden that she grows just to help feed people. We are thankful for your prayers and support of the Bread of Life Food Pantry. Please consider how you and your church could help provide for the hunger needs of those that come to the food pantry. Maybe have a food drive once or twice a year for the Bread of Life Food Pantry. Debbie Gambill, the coordinator, along with the team of several other volunteers will be happy to talk more with you about how your church can help this ministry. We need you!

BACKYARD BIBLE

God's faithfulness, and his promises kept, continue to be evident as Backyard Bible offers a rural, Gospel centered mission in Stokes County. Weekly worship, held on Wednesday nights, is the focus time of outreach as God's Word is taught in Bible Groups. Prayer needs are shared, praises are celebrated through music and testimonies, fellowship is enjoyed, and a meal is provided. A nonjudgmental worship setting is offered for youth and adults who may be hesitant to join a traditional style of worship. Love, acceptance, grace, and mercy are given to broken families and individuals who may be experiencing shame and resistance due to their sins, past lifestyles, or rejection.

The highlight of Backyard Bible's ministry has been the baptism of 16 people. New creatures in Christ are receiving discipleship and guidance as they have accepted Jesus and made a commitment to follow him.

Community Outreach is thriving as families are provided with food, clothing, school supplies, shoes, beds, and other necessities. The Annual Backpack Giveaway provides students with school supplies, Santa's Toy Store offers gifts to children, Turkey Dinners are given to families, and an ongoing demand for food is met monthly.

Community Connections are important as we carry the Gospel into nursing homes, schools, hospitals, animal shelters, and to local community partners. Gospel centered relationships are strong at Backyard Bible. "Doing Life" with broken people has led many families and individuals into a Christ centered lifestyle. People, and their need for Jesus, is the main focus in every area of this mission and ministry.

HEALING MINISTRIES

Healing Ministries- Is A Church plant from Crestwood Baptist Church to East Winston. Our call is to bring Healing to the Spiritual Educational Economic Relational and Societal (SEERS) brokenness that plagues our community through the gospel of Jesus Christ.

In 2023 Healing Ministries' impact to East Winston:

- We began our "Ready for the World Program." A deferment program for teen and young adult males in the juvenile Justice system. Since June, we have worked with 4 young men from the court and given each 20 hours of Gospel and Christian Discipleship, 20 hours of GED preparation and 10 hours of Career exploration. All 4 are now currently employed and hearing the gospel weekly.
- Our Young Men of Character, a Christ Centered and Gospel Grounded discipleship and Career apprenticeship program gave 8 high risk teens and 4 active gang members paid summer jobs, 40 hours of Bible, Devotion and discipleship. 49 hours of career training, and 20 hours of math and 20 hours of reading.
- Our "Redeemers" Basketball team held at Edgewood Baptist Church has held over 400 hours of sports, Bible Studies, and after school tutoring. 6 young men have accepted Christ as savior through this program.
- 30 Bible studies in youth detention centers.
- 130 gospel interactions with gang members age 13-27
- -20 Bible Studies to the elderly and disabled homes at crystal towers.

- -Baptized 2 young men and one entire family.
- -Served over 400 Hot meals
- -Has given 225 food boxes with groceries and household items.
- directly discipling 18 young men age 8-18
- directly discipling 8 Mothers through our Mothers with Purpose group.
- 7 girls currently being directly discipled through our "Girl of Virtue" program.
- we have begun Monthly services at Crestwood Baptist Church. The last Sunday of Each Month at 10:30am

Pivot Ministry – Equipping Women to Transform Their Lives

The term "pivot" can be defined in various ways, but it generally indicates a shift in direction. Pivot Ministry aims to inspire women who feel stuck to take a new path. Pivot exists to empower low-income women for better life and work opportunities. Whether a woman desires to better her employment status, personal relationships, spiritual journey, or self-perception, Pivot provides her with the necessary resources to reach her objectives.

EQUIPPING

Low-income women of working age who are determined to make a positive change in their lives are ideal candidates to be Pivot participants.

Pivot participants commit to a 16-week program that equips them with the essential knowledge and practical skills they need to succeed.

Classes cover Bible study, life skills, and job readiness.

Each woman is paired with a trained Christian mentor who provides encouragement and accountability.

One graduate shared, "With the tools I've been given, now I believe I can develop into the person I wanted to be. I came to Pivot looking for several things. I have found more than I imagined and it's all good." After graduating from Pivot, this same woman went on to complete her associate's degree and found a new job that utilizes her Godgiven gifts and talents – which she discovered during her time at Pivot!

TRANSFORMING

Setting goals is essential for achieving one's aspirations in life. At Pivot, women are taught the importance of setting SMART goals - Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Timely. Each participant has unique goals that may pertain to the various relationships in their lives which include those with themselves, with God, with other people, and with resources. Pivot strives to empower each participant with the tools she needs to experience restoration in one or more of these relationships. The transformation that takes place through Pivot is both exciting and inspiring. One woman said, "Do you realize how life changing just 2 classes have been for me? I am not the same woman already that you met just a very few short weeks ago, not one bit!" Pivot boasts a graduation rate 200% higher than predicted by local nonprofits that work with a similar demographic.

94% of Pivot graduates have met their job and education-related goals.

100% of the women who are a part of Pivot say it impacted their lives for the better.

Almost two-thirds of Pivot's graduates have volunteered with and/or donated to Pivot.

As women progress through Pivot, they form a tight-knit community built on trust, love, acceptance, and support. One woman explained, "Pivot gave me a sense of belonging to a family of women who understood me and what I have been through." After graduation, women are welcomed into the alumnae organization, Pivot Plus, which hosts quarterly workshops and events for continued growth and camaraderie.

SUPPORT PIVOT

Pivot is heavily dependent on its dedicated volunteers who do everything from teaching classes to mentoring to serving at events to providing lunch to serving on the board or committees ... and so much more. Last year volunteers invested over 2,100 hours! Over 50 community partner organizations and churches offer various means of support. TOY STORES

Every Christmas our churches and communities host Toy Stores across 5 counties that provide an opportunity for parents in need to pick out brand new toys for their kids reaching over 2,500 children with free gifts, hygiene products and food for their families. The toy stores began in 1983 with Mike Bradshaw of the PMBA at Mineral Springs Baptist Church, and was expanded under Karen Taylor's leadership. This has become a regionally-based outreach that has enabled dozens of our churches to directly participate in all aspects of this important ministry.

In 2022 we had 9 Toy Stores reaching over 769 families and giving gifts to more than 2700 kids! **This year we decided to donate 885 Jesus Storybook Bibles** so every family who comes through our stores could receive one this Christmas. "The Jesus Storybook Bible invites children to discover for themselves the one who is at the center of God's great rescue story — and at the center of their story, too." We are praying this has a huge impact on the children as well as their families. Since COVID in 2020 we have started a greater emphasis on cleaning and hygiene products as these items have become more necessary and expensive. We have churches, small groups, and individuals coming together to pack bags, donate gifts, greet people, counsel and pray with them, and share the joy of Christ this Christmas. 

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT




In 2018, we launched the first-ever Network-sponsored Marriage Retreat and followed that up with one in 2019. It was, as some put it, "the best thing the Network has ever done on behalf of ministers and their spouses." The past three years we have not been able to run this program. But in 2023, the Network sponsored a weekend retreat at Camp Caraway for 72 couples in the Spring. They were blessed by music from Jay Boyce and teaching from Wade Arnold. A 2024 marriage retreat is in the works so stay tuned! In addition to retreats, the Network provides additional services of Marriage Counseling for ministry couples who either need a "check-up" or more interventional assistance. Four years ago, we initiated a new service to pastors and their family members wherein we provided up to three free counseling sessions per church for ministers or their family members through a local Christian counseling ministry called The Barnabas Center. For 2022 we increased this to six sessions and we plan to continue it for 2023 and 24. Coupled with that, last year we begin an investment process in which we provided eight free sessions of coaching to develop life skills for the long-haul challenges of ministry. We not only plan to continue this but to expand this important service. In 2022 -23 we have seen people reach out for these services and God using it to bless and encourage our churches.



BAPTISTS ON MISSION AREAS OF WORK

At Baptists on Mission, our Purpose is to Glorify God by involving churches and Christians in meeting human needs in Jesus' name. We do that by offering a wide variety of opportunities for volunteers to be the hands and feet of Jesus. Everything from aviation missions where we fly patients to much-needed medical care, partnership missions, prayer ministries, medical, dental, construction, disaster relief, disaster recovery, etc.

Baptists on Mission volunteers serve in 19 ministries that include the following:

STATE/NATIONAL/INTERNATIONAL MISSION PROJECTS

God is changing lives through mission trips sponsored by Baptists on Mission in North Carolina (mission camps, Impact NC, Disaster Rebuilds, etc.) and to places such as Pennsylvania, Hawaii, New England, Rocky Mountain Region, Appalachian Coalfields, Alaska, Guatemala, Kenya, Armenia, Romania, Hungary, Moldova, Cuba, South Africa and other places. Many hundreds of volunteers serve in these partnerships every year. As a result of the war in Ukraine, we have sent and are sending teams and funds to assist refugees in Poland, Hungary. Moldova and inside of Ukraine to assist displaced people. Because of your generosity, our goal we fed more than 1,000,000 Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs) whose lives have been upended by the war in Ukraine. Additionally, this past Winter we were able to send more than 1000 stoves to Ukraine to assist those affected by the war.

Lives are being changed... The British missionary William Carey said, "Expect great things from God; attempt great things for God." Here are some of the things that we as NC Baptists have been doing to minister to people and to glorify God:

DISASTER RELIEF

God has blessed us with excellent disaster relief equipment and volunteers. North Carolina Baptists have five large disaster feeding units. The two largest units are capable of preparing and serving 30,000+ meals per day. We now have more than 250 disaster recovery trailers (owned by local churches and associations) used to clean up and repair work after a disaster. We also have six large shower units, three laundry units, a childcare unit, several large recovery units, large generator units, and lots of other disaster relief equipment that the Lord has provided. This past year NC Baptist Disaster Relief responded to the Kentucky Tornadoes, Rockingham County tornadoes, Hurricane Fiona in Puerto Rico, flooding in Kentucky and Virginia, Hurricane Ian in Florida, and other disasters.

DISASTER REBUILD

In September, 2018, Hurricanes Florence slammed our state and affected thousands of families. Three years later in August 2021, Tropical Storm Fred devastated Haywood and other counties in WNC. God has blessed us with rebuild centers where we can house, feed, and coordinate the work of thousands of rebuild volunteers. So far, we have helped more than 2000

families get back in their homes. There are more families still waiting for assistance in rebuilding their lives years after the storms. People in great need are hearing and seeing the love of Christ, and many people are coming to commit or to recommit their lives to Jesus.

MEDICAL/DENTAL MISSIONS

Baptists on Mission offers the use of the mobile medical/dental units to Baptist and non-Baptist churches and service organizations within North Carolina who wish to reach out to people in need. More than 100 clinics are held each year on the two mobile units. Patients targeted through this ministry may include the impoverished, Hispanic, and other ethnic groups, farm workers, fair workers, the homeless, the elderly, and more.

HEALTH SCREENING MINISTRY

Health disparities are prevalent in more impoverished neighborhoods. Our goal is to take healthcare to the most disadvantaged populations, thus improving community health navigation as we align local community health centers with patients seen at the mobile clinics. The unit's health screening tests include Hemoglobin A1C for diabetes screening, finger stick glucose, Cholestech LDX for total cholesterol and HDL results, body mass index calculation, depression screening, basic eye exams, and vital signs assessment. This ministry provides not only basic health screening clinics but spiritual assessments and counseling as well. Our hope is that by meeting a physical need, a spiritual door will be opened, and the love of Jesus can be shared.

STUDENT MISSIONS

Deep Impact helps North Carolina Baptist churches develop a comprehensive, coed youth missions strategy to produce committed followers of Christ. This strategy includes prepackaged mission weeks, free online mission studies, weekend mission retreats, hands-on mission training, and much more.

DI KIDS

One of our newest efforts is DI Kids (Deep Impact Kids), a missions weekend/week for children and their leaders. DI Kids Missions Weeks, Mini-weeks, and Weekends are prepackaged mission experiences sponsored by Baptists on Mission. They provide elementaryage students and their leaders/parents with the opportunity to share the love of God with people in NC. The children enjoy a great camp experience with a mission focus. Involving children in missions is an excellent beginning to develop disciple-making students and adults with love for missions.

OTHER MINISTRIES

In addition to the ministries described above, other ministries of Baptists on Mission designed to equip, motivate and mobilize volunteers to be involved in missions are Agriculture Missions, Aviation Ministry, Baptist Builders, Baptist Educators, Family Foundations, College Missions, Compassion Ministry, Church Renewal, Prayer Support, Sports and Recreation, Men's Ministry, Student Missions and Children's Missions.

MISSIONS CONFERENCE

The annual missions conference, sponsored by Baptists on Mission, includes music, testimonies, speakers, breakout sessions, mission fair exhibits, volunteer suppers, and much more. The desired end result is for participants to be spiritually renewed and inspired to

become involved in missions locally and worldwide. Over 1,600 people attend this conference every year.

REGIONAL MISSIONS RALLIES

Each spring and fall, Baptists on Mission sponsors regional rallies in all 10 regions of our state. These meetings are designed to challenge North Carolina Baptists across the state to greater mission involvement and promote the September North Carolina Missions Offering. The rallies are open for all men, women, and youth interested in missions.

BAPTISTS ON MISSION MAGAZINE

This publication is mailed twice each year to all church mission leaders on each level, mission volunteers, BOM ministry groups, youth directors, ministers of education, and pastors. Information is provided through this magazine to promote upcoming mission projects/events and to report on recently completed projects.

MISSION CAMPS

Every year an average of 5,000 volunteers respond to needs through the Mission Camps in Red Springs, Shelby, and Rose Hill (Charity). These Mission Camps are a great way to get your church involved in life-changing mission projects at a very affordable price.

STAFF

The Baptists on Mission Staff is committed to helping North Carolina Baptist churches involve their members in missions. INTERNATIONAL MISSION BOARD





This year has been active for the *Biblical Recorder (BR)*. In the past 12 months, we have:

- Implemented a management agreement with the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina that went into effect July 1, 2022, to ensure continual local news coverage for North Carolina Baptists.
- Continued to produce a printed magazine, weekly newsletter and active website presence highlighting local and national Baptist news.
- Assisted the state convention's board of directors in commissioning a study committee to help discern the next steps for the long-term strategy of the BR.
- Enhanced our social media presence across several platforms.
- Filled open staff positions and roles.

Led by Managing Editor Chad Austin, the BR staff team has worked hard to provide a continual stream of trusted news coverage for North Carolina Baptists in print, online and through social media. This has included timely coverage of news, events and happenings in N.C. Baptist life, feature stories on people and ministries across North Carolina, and content that adds insight, perspective and analysis of how national issues and trends impact N.C. Baptists. The staff has also been providing in-depth updates via a weekly email, all while producing a consistent, quality magazine on a regular basis.

At the time of this writing, the *Biblical Recorder* team and board of directors are awaiting the study committee's report and recommendations to help inform and guide the next steps for the *BR* moving forward.

Even across mainstream media channels, journalism looks very different than it did five years ago. Many struggled to be financially viable before the pandemic, and this trend only accelerated in 2020-2022. It is estimated that two newspapers shut down nationally every week.

While the stats are sobering, there has never been a time when a trusted source of news is more needed for North Carolina Baptists than today, and we look forward to continuing to provide that service in the months and years ahead.



The North America Mission Board (NAMB) helps pastors, churches and other Southern Baptist ministry partners more effectively engage the mission field in the United States, Canada and beyond. It's all about spreading the gospel throughout North America. That's our primary goal.

NAMB continues to sharpen its focus on evangelism, church planting and compassion ministry as we seek to be a resource to Southern Baptist pastors and churches. Through Send Network, our efforts revolve around the priority of helping churches plant new, evangelistic churches everywhere for everyone—especially in unreached and underserved areas, such as large cities and regions outside the South. Through Send Relief, we are engaging communities with the gospel through compassion ministry. NAMB also supports and resources Southern Baptist chaplains who serve in North America and around the world.

In the last 100 years, Southern Baptists—and evangelicals in general—have lost significant ground in the church-to-population ratio as the population in North America has continued to increase. It's estimated that there are now more than 281 million people in North America who are without Christ. The weight of this reality is especially felt in regions outside the Southern United States and in the areas where more than 81% of the population lives—in and around large cities.

To help Southern Baptists close this gap, NAMB has identified 35 regional and strategic Focus Areas for church planting and compassion ministry. These areas have vast

influence that, when reached, can become centers for gospel proclamation that make a global impact for the gospel. In reaching these strategic focus areas, Southern Baptists can lead many to Christ in North America and around the world.

As NAMB focuses ministry in these areas, we partner with Southern Baptists to plant churches everywhere for everyone and serve communities everywhere by meeting needs and changing lives through the power of the gospel.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA

Who we are: Since 1885, the heart of Baptist Children's Homes (BCH) has beat with a rhythm of hope that extends throughout North Carolina, South Carolina and Guatemala. For each person's specific need, we offer a unique ministry ready to help. It is only through the providence of God and being *on mission together* with NC Baptists throughout the state that we are able to minister to the myriad of needs and share God's love with those we are privileged to serve.

We are many ministries beating with one heart -- the heartbeat of Jesus.

Did you know: God has grown BCH from its roots as an orphanage to a sprawling non-profit organization that ministers to others from the first heartbeat to the last.

- BCH has locations in more than 35 communities in NC, SC and in Guatemala.
- BCH impacted 167,619 lives in 2022 through the support of NC Baptists.
- 80% of those we serve come to BCH unchurched and unreached for Jesus.
- There have been 661 professions of faith throughout the past five years.
- Through the **EVERY CHILD Foster & Adopt Initiative**, a partnership between BCH and NC Baptists, we train and license Christian couples to be foster families. We help churches to begin their own foster care ministries. There are more than 10,000 (*Data from morethanenough.cafo.org*) NC children in the state's foster care system who were removed from their homes for their protection. We believe the church is the answer for connecting children with caring, Christian homes. *Visit every-child.org*
- Also through EVERY CHILD, BCH's Christian Adoption Services aids couples with domestic and international adoption and ministers to expectant mothers to show them the beauty of choosing life for their babies by helping them make an adoption plan. Visit christianadopt.org
- The total number of foster homes licensed: 354. The total number of foster children served in BCH foster homes: 725.
- **Domestic adoptions have increased 41%** compared to this time last year.
- BCH oversees an orphanage and cottage homes at Good Shepherd Ministries in Xela,

Guatemala providing care to indigenous boys and girls who are abused and neglected.

- The ministry provides homes for intellectually/developmentally disabled adults.
- BCH operates the North Carolina Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) serving senior adults. *Visit ncbam.org*
- It offers 24/7 residential wilderness camp ministries that are accredited, non-public schools. *Visit cameronboyscamp.org and campduncannc.org*
- BCH provides a supportive home for teen mothers and their babies.
- Family Care offers a residential program for single mothers needing support.
- Greater Vision Outreach aids immediate needs of community families in crisis and connects them with resources to achieve long term stability.
- HOMEBASE offers resources to college students with little to no family support. **Highlights and Future Efforts:**
- Tirrell Discovers Family & Freedom, Accepts Christ: From isolation to salvation, Tirrell is experiencing family and freedom for the very first time. For years, he was confined in his childhood home never attending school and only being fed rice. His extreme situation was not discovered until he was almost a teen. Now, he has found his family through John and Erin Stuebe who were trained and licensed as foster parents through the EVERY CHILD Initiative, a partnership between BCH and NC Baptists. Through the couple's discipleship and church involvement, Tirrell accepted Christ on June 16. Tirrell's story is the focus of the Annual Offering. The Week of Prayer is

November 5-12. The new video and offering resources are at bchoffering.org

- Emmanuel Home Welcomes First Resident: The new residential ministry for mothers who have chosen adoption for their babies, has its first resident. This birth mother comes from Eastern NC and has no family support. She found a job almost immediately.
- NC Baptists throughout the state **collected more than \$500,000 in food, supplies and gift cards** through the annual "Food Roundup."
- Bikers participating in "Ride to Clyde," the statewide motorcycle ride organized in partnership with NC Baptists, **raised a record \$178,002.00.**
- Efforts are in place for a new collaboration between BCH's Intellectual & Developmental Disabilities Ministry and NC Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM). This

will bolster each ministry and continue to grow our services to the local community including the aging population as well as families with special-needs members.

- Two new Innovations in Special Needs Ministry: The first new effort is known as "Special Homes for Special Adults," known in the Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD) field as Alternative Family Living. This is where families or individuals open up their homes for a special needs adult to live. A family in Greensboro will be the first within this new model of care. The second new effort are Inclusion Classes at the Weekday Education center in Thomasville, one of the few places serving special needs children. Inclusion Classes are designed to mix special needs children with typically developing boys and girls so they help each other learn and grow.
- NC Baptist Aging Ministry (NCBAM) opened the first of its **new** "Care Villages" at BCH's Kennedy Home in Kinston with help from the Neuse Baptist Association and area churches. Plans are in place for a Care Village at the Baptist Convention building in Cary. NCBAM works with churches, aging-service providers, and others to bring services to Care Village members living in their own homes. This allows them to age "in community." Learn more at ncbam.org. Love Out Loud's mission is to transform our city with the love of Jesus by connecting and mobilizing people and resources. We know that great Kingdom-minded churches and great collaborative organizations (like the Triad Church Network!) have been doing just that for many years before we came on the scene!

And, yet, since 2008, we are humbled and grateful to play some small but purposeful role in convening pastors, leaders, and lay people, collaborating with churches, nonprofits, schools and just about anybody else at work in our community, and connecting people and resources to all kinds of strong efforts to do the missional work of The Church across our community.

Since we began, Matthew 25:31-46 has been a guiding text for us — to feed the hungry, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, visit the prisoner and help the least of these in need...all in partnership with local churches and their members looking to live out Christ's call to love God and neighbor in tangible ways throughout their week.

Love Out Loud partners with well over 150 churches to support their priorities in local missions and to connect people who are called to serve to nonprofits and ministries in Forsyth and surrounding communities. Much of our work is highly relational, whether around specific partnership events like Christmas for the City, Joy Prom, Gift Mart, Cycle Recycle and 25 other programs or helping the 4,341 volunteers registered on BASE (our digital platform: volunteer.loveoutloudws.com) explore, connect and serve with the 287 nonprofits and ministries in our area.

We are thankful for the support of and partnership with the Triad Church Network, its partner churches and the many Christians making a difference in our communities. We look forward to further Kingdom-minded, Christ-centered, city-focused partnership in 2024!
